### World Mission Sunday Consider the Source October 19, 2025

We call scripture the “word of God.” That’s a grand claim. If God said it, or wrote it, such an idea carries a great deal more currency than if you or I take the credit for it. We may be smart on a good day; God is the very author of Wisdom and remains the source of truth through all eternity. That’s the difference. It’s considerable.

Today’s passage from 2 Timothy is celebrated in *Dei Verbum*, Vatican II’s Dogmatic Constitution on Divine Revelation. This document tells us how Catholics understand the Bible, especially how it acts as revelatory source and inspired text for us. All scripture is inspired and useful, it declares. All. This includes what we dismissively refer to as the *Old Testament*—which was, to the writer of Timothy, what he meant by scripture to begin with. So the story about doddering old Moses getting a little help from his friends in the task of prayer is at least as useful for our consideration today as the parable—or the psalm. Bible scholar Raymond Collins even wrote a book called *Preaching the Epistles* for those brave enough to do that on a Sunday. When it comes to the word of God, we often operate from a false sense of biblical hierarchy.

Furthermore, this much-cited passage from Timothy tells us how scripture is useful: It equips us for the good work we’re called to do, for our vocation to discipleship. So when we consider the three old men literally holding down the fort in spiritual warfare against Amalek, that helps us to appreciate how our faith-sharing groups, Rosary before Mass, and monthly adoration crowd contribute vitally to the life of the church. Reflecting on our confidence in God’s fidelity—as the psalmist does—enables us to step out in faithful action more boldly. When Jesus tells a story about the need for a tireless commitment to prayer (scholar Mary Ann Getty calls Jesus “Our Prayin’ Lord” in Luke’s gospel), it’s a wake-up call to take the injunction to pray unceasingly more seriously. All of that is inspired advice, full of the breath of God waiting for us to exhale it into the world.

Proclaim this word whether convenient or inconvenient, we’re told in Timothy. But which word, just the letter itself? Hardly. It’s the divine word we’re exhorted to proclaim—and proclamation obliges us to more than mere profession of it. It’s not enough to say, “Oh yeah, the Bible is God’s word, I believe it.” Good for you; proclamation, however, involves trumpeting this message far and wide in speech and lived example. And proclamation is not just Father’s job, as some of us were raised to imagine. Don’t forget: When it comes to doing God’s will, even Moses couldn’t do it alone.

### For Better Understanding of Mass Intentions

**Canon law** allows parishes to prohibit or restrict individual mass intentions on Christmas and Christmas Day. Often reserving these days for the intentions of all parishioners (Pro Populo). Many parishes implement their own policies on accepting intentions, citing the high demand for these particular days and their significance to the faithful as reasons for these restrictions. **Canon law** requires one Mass on holy days of obligation and Sundays to be offered for the intentions of the people (pro populo). While other Mass intentions can be requested some for holy days, the Holy Triduum (Holy Thursday, Good Friday, Easter Vigil) and All Souls Day are typically reserved for the specific intentions designated by the Church and additional intentions are generally not scheduled for these days.

#### Key Provisions:

High Demand: Many parishioners wish to have their loved ones remembered on these very important holy days, making it difficult to accommodate every request.

The Pro Populo Obligation: Canon Law requires a priest to celebrate Mass on Sundays and other holy days of obligation for the intentions of the people (Pro Populo).

Allowing Everyone Opportunity: Limiting individual intentions allows more people the chance to have their loved or deceased one prayed for at Christmas.

Pro Populo Obligation: Priests, pastors and diocesans bishops, are obligated by Canon Law (canons 388, 429, 534, and 540.1) to offer one Mass each Sunday and holy day of obligation for the spiritual needs of their parishioners, known as the pro populo Mass.

Reserved Days: Intentions for individual requests cannot be scheduled for the Holy Triduum or All Souls Day (November 2) because these days have specific, solemn intentions already assigned to the Church.

**Faith Formation News**  
**October 19, 2025**

In Jesus' time, people who were not Jewish were called Gentiles. Some of the disciples felt that Gentiles could not become Christians. One day when Peter was talking to a crowd of Gentiles, the Holy Spirit came down on them. Peter realized that God wants all people to know Jesus. Peter offered the Gentiles the gift of Baptism. Through Baptism they became members of God's family, the Church.

Members of the Church experience God's grace in different ways. Most importantly, they are strengthened by God's grace when they celebrate the sacraments.

**Holy Signs from God**

A sacrament is a holy sign that shows God the Father is with us. Jesus, God's Son, gave the sacraments to the Church.

The Sacraments of Initiation are Baptism, the Eucharist, and Confirmation. These sacraments bring us into God's family and give us grace. Grace is a gift we receive from God. It helps us live as God wants us to live.

**Baptism**

Baptism is the first sacrament we receive. It is the beginning of our new life with Jesus. We are saved from Original Sin and all personal sin in Baptism. It gives us sanctifying grace. This is the gift of God's new life in us. We become a member of the Church when we are baptized. We become part of God's family.

**Eucharist**

When we celebrate the Sacrament of the Eucharist, we receive the Body and Blood of Christ. This is called Holy Communion. The wheat bread and grape wine are transformed into the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ during the Sacrament of the Eucharist. This happens when the priest prays the words of consecration.

**Confirmation**

In this sacrament, the Holy Spirit confirms the grace of our Baptism and strengthens us to be witnesses to Jesus. Confirmation makes us stronger in faith through God's sanctifying grace and helps us become better Christians. The sacraments are powerful signs that God is with us. Through these signs, God gives us grace. Each sacrament builds our faith.
